strategic priorities

As an organisation representing Australasian universities, ACODE's mission is to enhance policy and practice in open, distance, flexible and e-learning in Australasian higher education by:

- · disseminating and sharing knowledge and expertise;
- supporting professional development and providing networking opportunities;
- · investigating, developing and evaluating new approaches;
- · advising and influencing key bodies in higher education; and
- · promoting best practice.

A strategic planning intensive was held at RMIT in October 2008. Members contributed their thoughts and efforts both prior to and since this meeting and ACODE is updating its Strategic Plan for 2009-2011.

advocacy and alliance visits

ACODE continues to build working relationships with external organisations, including the Ministry of Education in New Zealand and Ako Aotearoa (the National Centre for Tertiary Teaching Excellence). Gordon Suddaby and Stephen Marshall met with Murray Brown from NZ Ministry of Education and in early August Gordon Suddaby and Alan Farley had productive visits with Evan Arthur of the Department Education Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) and Richard Johnstone and Elizabeth McDonald of the Australian Learning and Teaching Council (ALTC).

submissions

An ACODE submission to the Bradley Review of Australian Higher Education was lodged in July.

eMaturity Model

Stephen Marshall and Geoff Mitchell are leading an ACODE funded project implementing the eMaturity Model in Australia. A QUT research assistant has been actively collecting data from the Australian pilot members and now also collecting from a NZ participant. Support material scoping information on furthering this eMaturity Model project is being explored with a view to submitting an application to ALTC in the next scheduled funding round. This would entail 6-8 ACODE member institutions signing up for part of this 2-3 year project.

AUQA

AUQA invited expressions of interest from ACODE regarding names of possible people to go onto the Auditors Register. As a result, both Gordon Suddaby and Stephen Marshall are now on the list as 'offshore representatives with an interest in eLearning'. Alan Farley has also received an invitation for inclusion as an Australian auditor on the register.
